

ICU/HOSPITAL BED USE







### COVID-19 CASES BY DAY




### PERCENTAGE OF POSITIVE TESTS

# HOSPITAL BEDS FOR COVID-19 DOES NOT INCLUDE 2,600 ADDITIONAL SURGE BEDS




ICU Beds in Use

### VENTILATORS FOR COVID-19









#### New reported cases by day in Arizona




















### CASE TRENDS IN THE UNITED STATES, D.C, AND PUERTO RICO

#### 3-DAY MOVING AVERAGE



- Free, non-medical cloth masks to Arizonans who are 65 and older or medically-vulnerable
- Starting TOMORROW, JULY 17, Arizona citizens in these vulnerable categories simply need to visit azhealth.gov/OrderMasks to submit their order
- Each order will receive a package of five (5) cloth masks shipped directly to their residential address free of charge [limit one order per household]
- The State will also work with licensed congregate care facilities to provide direct shipments to meet the needs of their residents in these categories

#### ARIZONA: OPEN FOR LEARNING

- Working with Superintendent Hoffman, school leaders, teachers, parents to ensure students continue receiving quality education through the pandemic.
- Focus on flexibility for school leaders, public health for students and teachers, and a priority around students in low-income communities.

#### EXPANDING TESTING

#### PROJECT CATAPULT

- Partnership between Sonora Quest Laboratories, Euroimmun/PerkinElmer, and ADHS
- Sonora Quest expects to exponentially increase their ability to process tests. process 35,000 diagnostic tests per day by the end of July, and up to 60,000 tests per day by the end of August.

### ASU introduces first-of-its-kind COVID-19 testing

The test is saliva-based, pain-free, and reportedly has a number of advantages.

#### **COVID-19 TESTING STRIKE FORCE SITES**

- What: Partnership today with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to provide additional diagnostic testing in Arizona. Cloth-face coverings provided to all participants.
- When: Beginning Friday, July 17 for 12 straight days

## CONTINUED INVESTMENTS IN PUBLIC HEALTH

#### SIGNIFICANT INVESTMENTS IN PUBLIC HEALTH

- Over \$5.7 billion in unemployment benefits
- \$441 million for cities and counties
- \$270 million for schools and school districts
- \$150 million to advance FEMA reimbursements to non-profits and local jurisdictions
- \$70 million for testing
- \$60 million for PPE
- \$35 million for contact tracing

- \$33 million for additional hospital capacity and staff
- \$9 million for election-related funding
- \$5 million for homeless shelters
- \$5 million for eviction assistance
- \$1.75 million to enhance food security and millions more to help those most vulnerable.

#### KNOW THE RISK

#### SAFER AT HOME: QUESTIONS TO CONSIDER BEFORE GOING OUT

- How many people will you interact with?
- Can you keep 6 feet of space between you and others? Will you be outdoors or indoors?
- What's the length of time that you will be interacting with people?

#### HOSPITAL RESOURCES

#### STAFFING INITIATIVE

- Contract with Vizient, Inc. to provide nursing staff to hospitals for 6 weeks
- Cost is assumed by ADHS

#### **Priorities:**

- 1) Rural small hospitals with high transfers through the Arizona Surge Line
- 2) Large hospitals that accept high numbers of transfers through the Arizona Surge Line

#### STAFFING INITIATIVE

- Staffing was granted to each of the health systems who applied
- A total of 584 out of state nurses will be provided to aid 21 hospitals
  - 250 Medical-Surgical Nurses
  - 334 ICU/Critical Care Nurses
  - 74 percent of the nurses were provided to the Central and Southern regions
- Consideration to specialty services such as ECMO were considered

#### POST ACUTE CARE INITIATIVE

- \$10 Million dollars to expand post acute care capacity for patients recovering from COVID-19
  - Negotiating contract with Skilled Nursing Facility
  - Provider has COVID wards and units
  - Potential to provide up to 330 additional beds

#### Ongoing Activities

- Engaging stakeholder to identify additional post acute options
- Working with other partners/facilities to bring on additional capacity through the incentive program
- Adding to the Post Acute Care Capacity Tracker (PACCT) Dashboard to assist hospitals with discharge planning

## PANDEMIC UNEMPLOYMENT ASSISTANCE & RELIEF

#### PANDEMIC UNEMPLOYMENT RELIEF

- \$6,448,014,077 unemployment benefits paid to date.
- 958,001 Arizonans currently receiving unemployment relief
  - 330,695 Unemployment Benefits
  - 627,306 Pandemic Unemployment Assistance
- Arizona is experiencing the fraud attempts witnessed in other states.
  - Working with the FBI and the Department of Labor continue combating this fraud and ensure these dollars are preserved for Arizonans who need them.

## STRENGTHENING HOUSING PROTECTIONS FOR ARIZONANS IMPACTED BY COVID-19

#### **EVICTION PROTECTION**

- March 24: Executive Order delaying evictions for those impacted by COVID-19.
- Established the COVID-19 Rental Assistance Program, administered by Arizona Community Action Agencies.
- To date \$1,122,963.96 has been provided to Arizona renters.
- Order is set to expire on July 25.

#### **NEW EXECUTIVE ORDER**

- Extending eviction moratorium on residential evictions until October 31.
- \$650,000 for **Community Action Agencies** to improve staffing and administration of rental assistance programs, providing assistance to families and individuals faster.
- \$5 million to establish the Foreclosure Prevention Program.
  - Providing targeted relief to homeowners who rely on income from tenants, helping them avoid foreclosure.
- In total, state and local governments have directed more than \$80 million on programs to assist renters and prevent homelessness.

#### **ADDITIONAL ACTIONS**

- **Earlier this week:** \$1.6 million from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) was distributed to combat homelessness.
  - The funding will support counseling services, guidance on independent living, rental assistance and as well as homeless shelters throughout the state.
- **Provided \$250,000** from Chicanos Por La Causa for the organization's Statewide Housing Program, which finds housing for homeless individuals.
- In May: \$300,000 provided to St. Vincent De Paul and Open Hearts, providing Arizonans in need with rental assistance, telehealth and transportation to health services.

## MOVING FORWARD OUR PLAN OF ACTION

#### THE PLAN AHEAD

- We're going to continue taking a responsible approach, guided by public health
- Continue ramping up testing in Arizona to identify infections
  - Increasing Lab Capacity
  - Additional Collection Sites
- Continue relief to county health officials in contact tracing to contain the spread
- Monitor the efficacy of our mitigation strategies

#### **METRICS TO WATCH**

- Cases
- Testing & Percent Positivity Rate
  - At the state and county level
  - Indicates the rate of spread and broad testing availability
- Mobility & R<sub>t</sub>
  - Arizonans are safer at home this metric quantifies non-essential travel
  - R<sub>t</sub> indicates the rate of spread
- Capacity
  - Monitoring our ability to care for Arizonans
