EDUCATION FUNDING HIGHLIGHTS

- **\$30 million** to ensure K-12 students have access to school transportation
 - **\$20 million** in FY 2022 and **\$10 million** in FY 2023
- \$1 million to fund Career and Technical Education Certification Exams
- \$1.3 million to waive Advanced Placement (AP) Exam fees for low-income students
- An additional \$2.5 million for College Credit by Examination Incentive Program (CCEIP)
 - Currently, the state provides \$5 million in bonuses to teachers and schools through the CCEIP for students who have received college credits via exams such as AP or International Baccalaureate (IB)
- **\$3.1 million** to hire 25 literacy coaches to provide schools in need with technical assistance to support, improve and sustain effective teaching and literacy practices
- \$1.5 million for Kindergarten Entry Evaluation, allowing schools to target resources to students who need them most
- \$1 million for teacher reading instruction exams, ensuring all new elementary educators are equipped to implement effective literacy education strategies
- **\$400,000** for Jobs For Arizona Graduates (JAG) to support at-risk students and set them up for post-graduation success
- **\$500,000** for the Alternative Teacher Development Program ensure students in need have access to high quality education. This investment also allows for increased funding for these programs due to matching requirements, doubling the investment being made in Arizona's future educators
- \$400,000 to support adult education programs, enabling the draw down of additional federal funding as well
- **\$50 million** as a part of Arizona's funding formula for K-12 education, students with disabilities receive additional funding to fund additional services they might need in their education
- \$1 million in estimated formula funding to support programs for gifted and talented students
 - \$850,000 for the State to acquire and utilize an assessment to identify gifted students statewide
- \$5 million for statewide assessment funding
- \$5 million for special education service costs, such as one-on-one care
- \$35 million to reduce the K-12 rollover in the state, increasing the impact to schools with less than 2,000 students
